## v. Alexander Phillip Gruber

## **Biographical** Summary

(971) Alexander Phillip Gruber was born February 1, 1911, in Chicago. (1294) In the early 1930's, he moved to New York. In February 1942, he went to the Los Angeles area, (1295) with a short stay in Chicago in between. (1296) He was married in New York and had two children. (1297) Eva Grant told the Warren Commission that Gruber's nickname was "Musty." (1298) Gruber, now retired, was previously employed as a scrap metal dealer in the Los Angeles-Burbank area. (1299)

## The Committee's Investigation

(972) The materials reviewed by the committee gave no indication of Gruber's financial or social position, nor of his political or law enforcement connections. The committee obtained a copy of Gruber's criminal record from the FBI, which showed a number of theft-related arrests and dispositions in various jurisdictions. (1300)

(973) Relationship with Ruby.—Alex Gruber told the FBI that he grew up in the same neighborhood as Jack Ruby, went to grammar school with him, and even lived with him for approximately 1 year in a Chicago boarding house, when they were both about 20 years old. (1301) Gruber told the committee that Ruby's father lived in his neighborhood, although Ruby did not, that Ruby would hang around his neighborhood, and that they became friends (1302) and would go to football games and boxing matches. (1303) Gruber described his Chicago relationship with Ruby as "very close." (1304) In his Warren Commission testimony Ruby had described Gruber as a "bad kid in those days. \* \* \*" (1305) Following his stint as Ruby's roommate, Gruber moved to New York and lost contact with Ruby.

(974) The time of Gruber's next contact with Ruby is uncertain. In 1964, Gruber told the FBI that he saw Ruby in 1946 or 1949, when Gruber stopped in Dallas en route to Chicago. (1396) This social visit was apparently the sole motive for the Dallas side trip. In 1978, however, Gruber told the committee that he and another individual were on the road selling pots and pans and that Dallas was one of the stops on their itinerary. (1307) When questioned by FBI agents immediately following the assassination weekend, Gruber stated that he had taken this trip about 10 years prior, which would place it in 1953. (1308) In all interviews Gruber has stated that Ruby and he had met at Ruby's nightclub; he told the committee that he had stayed in the club (and in Dallas) for only a few hours. (1309)

(975) Their next contact occurred about 2 weeks before the assassination when Gruber again went out of his way to visit Ruby in Dallas, this time arriving from Joplin, Mo. Gruber told the FBI in 1964 that he had been in New York attending a relative's wedding and had then gone to Joplin to get information about a carwash facility. (1310) In 1978, Gruber stated that he could not have gone to a wedding at that time, but admitted that he was in Joplin. (1311) Gruber said he decided to visit Ruby because Joplin was only 100 miles from Dallas. (1312) "I don't know why I went there, really," said Gruber, "I can't remember. I just went there." (1313) (976) In 1964, Gruber said that he had stayed in Dallas for several days, seeing Ruby a number of times, including one visit to the Carousel from 6 p.m. until closing. (1314) Yet in 1963, Gruber had told the FBI that he had been in Dallas only 1 night and part of the following day. (1315) When Gruber and Ruby did meet, they discussed past experiences in Chicago, Ruby's business problems involving non-union dancers, Ruby's problems with his sister, and Gruber's possible involvement in a carwash facility. (1316) (Ruby told the Warren Commission that Gruber had also tried to interest Sam Ruby in the carwash endeavor.) (1317) Ruby asked if Gruber had any connections with the labor union (AGVA), which Gruber did not, (1318) and promised to send Gruber a dachshund puppy that he owned. (1319) While in Dallas on this trip, Gruber also visited (for the first time) Eva Grant, who was hospitalized at the time. (1320)

(977) Gruber called Ruby on the telephone at the Carousel on November 17, 1963, at 9:28 p.m. (1321) This call lasted 8 minutes, and Gruber surmised that it involved the possible purchase of letters for the marquee signs at the Carousel from a Los Angeles company, (1322) although Gruber's recollection of the call was extremely limited. (1323) (978) Ruby called Gruber following the President's assassination, at 2:37 p.m. (1324) Gruber stated that he received the call 20 minutes after the assassination, (1325) but he must have meant 20 minutes after he learned of the event if the times are to coincide. This was one of the first calls made by Ruby that afternoon, and he was very upset. Gruber said Ruby sobbed on the telephone when speaking of the assassination and finally had to hang up, being unable to continue. In 1963, Gruber related this conversation as follows:

**RUBY.** Did you hear what happened?

GRUBER. You mean the shooting of the President?

RUBY. Yes, ain't that a terrible thing. I'm all upset and my sister is hysterical. You don't know this, Al, but I started all my programs with a patriotic number. I'm crying and I can't talk to you anymore. (1326)

In his 1964 FBI interview, Gruber mentioned that they had discussed the carwash business and the dog that Ruby was to send, before the news of the assassination was brought up. (1327) In 1978 he stated that only the dog was discussed. (1328) Telephone records indicate that the call only lasted 3 minutes, (1329) casting some doubt on Gruber's fuller 1964 account.

(979) Gruber had three subsequent contacts by mail with Ruby. The first involved the sending of a puppy to Gruber, which Ruby had instructed Andrew Armstrong, a Carousel employee, to take care of while Ruby was in jail.(1330) The second was a letter which Gruber sent to Ruby several months after the Oswald shooting.(1331) This letter was missing from the Dallas police department files when the Committee examined them in 1978. Gruber had told the FBI that in the letter he expressed his sorrow over Ruby's predicament.(1332)

(980) The third mail contact was a letter from Ruby, postdated February 4, 1964. It had a return address of 505 Main St., Dallas. In this letter, Ruby acknowledged receipt of Gruber's letter, thanked him for it, mentioned the dog, and said he was sorry that Gruber had been

caused so much trouble as a result of the call made to him November 22, 1963. (1333) Ruby was ostensibly referring to the FBI's questioning Gruber, but there had also been an anonymous telephone threat at 12:45 a.m. on November 25, 1963, at Gruber's home, in which the caller stated "ask him [Gruber] if he likes livin'."(1334)

(981)The FBI also investigated another alleged Ruby to Gruber telephone call on Sunday morning, November 24, 1963, prior to the Oswald shooting. The FBI had received information from the Los Angeles police department that the proprietor of a hamburger stand related (on November 26, 1963) that a man named Gruber had told him of such a call. (1335) The man supposedly said that Ruby had told him that he was going to shoot Oswald. Possible verification of the incident was a reference to a Gruber-Ruby acquaintance "back East," possibly in Chicago. The proprietor had denied this story when the FBI spoke to him on November 27, 1963, and although a different source mentioned the same basic story to the FBI, this second source's information was at best third- or fourth-hand hearsay. Verification was not conducted by the FBI. (1336) Gruber has denied any knowledge of such an incident and of any weekend calls from Ruby besides the one on Friday afternoon. (1337)

(982) It is known that Eva Grant called Gruber within 10 days of the assassination to inquire about the dog and to thank Gruber for his visit to the hospital, (1338) although Gruber had no recollection of this call. (1339)

(983) Despite his relationship with Ruby, Gruber stated that he had no knowledge of Ruby's Dallas associates or activities, legal or otherwise. (1340) He has remarked that Ruby came from a fine family and had always been patriotic, (1341) although Gruber never considered Ruby to be interested in politics. (1342)

## Treatment by the Warren Commission

(984) The Warren Commission's treatment of Alex Gruber was at best cursory and without any focus, although staff counsels Hubert and Griffin wrote a memorandum that referred to the investigation of Gruber. (1343) Gruber himself was not questioned by the Commission. Alice Nichols, (1344) Ralph Paul. (1345) Hyman Rubinstein, (1346) and George Senator (1347) said that they had never heard of him. Earl Ruby knew that Gruber and Jack Ruby had lived together in Chicago and that Ruby had called Gruber on November 22. (1348) Eileen Kaminsky also had heard of this phone call. (1349) As noted earlier, Gruber was also mentioned in the Commission testimony of Eva Grant and Jack Ruby. (1350)

Eva worked with a bunch of people from Chicago in 12 San Francisco. He asked me about a name. What the hell was 13 that? Oh, Goldsmith or Goldstein. 4 Frank Goldstein? Q 15 А Yes. Now I didn't -- I knew him in '42 or '4- --15 when I worked in the shipyards in Frisco. He was in with 17 the fellows from around Chicago. They all lived in one 18 neighborhood in Frisco. 17 Q And you knew him in Chicago? 20 Α No. 2! 0 You just knew him in San Francisco? 22 I didn't even know he lived in Chicago, but Eve Δ 23 Grant told me that she worked with this Goldstein and, oh, 24 about ten other guys. They used to go in crews. Everybody 25 was broke in them days and they used to go out and sell

newspapers house to house. What do you call it? Subscrip-1 tions -- and they would give them so much, just like people 2 sell insurance. 3 Q And that was in --4 And all that crew was Chicago people. I wasn't A 5 there at that time. I came just after they quit and the 5 war began. I had to start working in the shipyards. 7 Q Did Goldstein know Jack Ruby? 3 Yes, I imagine he did. I didn't know Goldstein \$ Α that good. ١đ For how long did you know Goldstein? Q 11 А Personally, probably I seen him five times, six 12 12 times. Did you have any business dealings with him?-Q 14 No. At that time I don't know what he was doing, 15 Α lć even. He didn't have no money. I think he was working in the shipyards too, but then he became a bookmaker. Then I 17 heard he had money, but I didn't see him them. 18 19 He did that in San Francisco? 0 20 Yes. Well, I didn't see him then. I left Frisco. Α 21 We lived there one year. 22 Which vear, '45? 0 23 А I can't remember. 24 '45, somewhere in there? Q 25 A I really can't remember. Let's see. My kids were

1	my kids were about seven, eight years old. That's about 32
2	years ago. What year would that be?
3	Q '46.
+	A Around there.
5	Q Okay. You say you don't remember whom you went to
ś	Dallas with on that 1953 trip.
7	A No.
8	Q How long did you stay in Dallas?
9	A Just a couple hours. Just a couple hours. We
10	stopped in and the fight kind of upset us and we went away.
11	Q Did you do any business in Dallas?
12	A No.
13	Q Did you try to sell anything there?
14	A No.
15	Q But had you gone there to sell things?
lć	A No, I just stopped there to see Jack.
17	Q Well, Dallas is
18	A We were going to sell stuff in any city. It didn't
19	matter where we stopped.
20	Q Did you try to sell things along the way too?
21	A Yes. Gas stations and farmers and
22	Q So in other words, it didn't hurt that you went
20	way out of your way on the way to Chicago?
24	A No. Any place we went was all right.
25	Q Was there anybody in particular you were going to see
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1 in Chicago or you just had come from there, so --I really can't remember. I don't even remember 2 Α 3 getting to Chicago; I will tell you the truth. I am getting 4 kind of senile. I don't remember what I ate yesterday. 5 Did you know anyone else in Dallas in 1953? Q ó Α No. 7 So you didn't have anyone else to look up? Q 8 Α I never knew anybody in Dallas, except him and his ş sister, and the first time I met her was the second time I came to Dallas, not the first time. 10 11 Okay. So through this visit in 1953, that you say Q 12 lasted just a couple of hours, you probably just saw him a 13 couple hours. 14 А That is all. 15 Did you have dinner with him at his club? Q 1á А No. 17 You just came into the club and --Q 18 Yes. And then the fight started and he was in the Δ 19 back room, washing. He was all black and blue. These guys 20 kicked him and I didn't want to stand there no more. You know, 21 I just left right then. 22 Did you say good-bye? Q 23 A Yes. I said to him, "I am leaving." 24 2 Was he pretty much under control after the fight was 25 over?

1 1 A Jack was a loner -- I will tell you that -- with men. He was a loner, really. 2 3 0 He kind of was on his own, then? А Huh? 4 5 Q He was kind of on his own, then? ć А Always. He always was, since I always knew him he 7 always was. Even when he lived with us, he was a loner. Who else was living with you and Jack in Chicago? 3 Q 9 Α Well, it wasn't -- they didn't live there, actually. 10 Guys came around there. They didn't actually live there. 11 We lived by the beach. Him and I lived by the beach and 12 guys would come from the beach, change their clothes and go 13 out to the beach and stuff like that. 14 0 When was the next time you saw Jack Ruby after the 15 | 1953 visit? ١ź Α That was the time -- I think that was a week before 17 the President got killed. 18 0 So it was Nobember of 1963? 19 A A week, two weeks, something like that, yes. 20 0 What took you to Dallas on that occasion? 21 A Well, now I can remember what happend. Now I can 22 tell you, because it brings it back. I told Jack Ruby about 23 a -- when I -- while I was sitting, talking with him, before 24 this beef started --22 Q This is 1953?

1 1	A	Yes.

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Q Okay.

A Some guy told me about laundromats here. You see them all over now, but at that time there were none here.

- Q In Dallas?
- A In here, this city here.

Q I see.

There were no laundromats. And then some guy in A 3 Inglewood -- I found out about it. I think it was a doctor 9 and he had seven of them. And somebody told me about him; 10 he heard about it and he says they are money-makers and nobody 11 knows about it because it is a -- if you look at it, it looks 12 like a place that is starving. You know, you don't see --12 so anyway. I investigated it and I found out about it, but I 14 15 1 didn't have no money of my own. And when I was going through 16 Dallas, I told Ruby about it, then not knowing -- but I found out later -- his brother, Sammy, opened four of them places 17 and made a living out of them. That is what he did for a 19 1 living. That is what Jack told me the second time I seen him. 20 0 He told you that in 1963 about the laundromats? 21 No. I told it to him in '53, the first time I seen Α 22 him. 23

Q Okay. You talked about the laundromats the first
time you saw him in Dallas, which was 1953?
A Yes. Now the second time when I was there, he

called up his sister-in-law and I don't know if they were feuding or something, but she wouldn't tell him where Sammy 2 was and he told -- he told her that the guy that told him 3 about the laundromats was here and he had a better thing than the laundromats. 5

On the way through, I seen a bunch of cars standing ó in a line and I followed these cars. It looked like a movie 7 drive-in and they were all going in these quarter wash. You 3 could -- you know, where you wash your car for a quarter. \$ That never was out here either. So I walked up to a guy and he told me about it. He says -- he says, "I run this. I 11 have this territory." So I says, "Well, I am from California.' 12 So he says, "Do you want to get the concession for these --" 12

14 So anyway, he took me where they manufacture them 15 and I talked to the owner and he give me a bunch of -- what do they call them? Booklets, anyway. 1á

Q Brochures or something?

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18 Brochures about his business, you know, about this А 19 business. And I got a friend there, owns a store and got 70 money, owns a business, and I told him about it. He says, 21 "Gee, it sounds like a good thing," and he was in with a 22 builder. So he says, "I will write the guy a letter," and he 23 filled out, told him he is worth a half a million dollars, 24 the other guy; they owned property and everything. And he 25 told me if they get it, he would let me run it and I would be

a partner. They would put up the money and the builder would 1 build the things and they would buy the equipment. 2 Anyway, the guy sent him back another brochure about 3 his education. The guy got mad and tore it up and he says 4 the heck with them. He says, "Anybody could have a half a 5 million dollars and a guy wants to know how much education." ć He says, "I don't want to talk to him." And that was the 7 end. 3 9 Anyway, that is what I told Jack about these here They hadn't ever come out here. The guy took me things. 10 around --11 What was his name? Do you remember? 0 12 А Who? 13 They guy in Dallas --0 14 These here ---15 Α ١á -- who told you about the --0 It wasn't in Dallas. This wasn't in Dallas. I 17 Α 18 think it was in -- before I hit Dallas, some state before 19 I hit Dallas. 20 Oh. So you told Jack about it when you got there? Q 21 Yes, that I had seen it and I showed him the brochures Α 22 The guy give me quite a bit of them and I showed it to him and 23 I told him, "Maybe you would be interested in that. You 24 could start it here." 25 Q Where did you talk to him about that? Was that at /

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t	the club?
2	A Yes.
3	Q What club was that? Was that the Carousel?
4	A Yes. I stayed across the street for two days, in
5	that hotel right across the street. I think I stayed there
ó	two days.
7	Q HOw did you happen to go to Dallas in 1963?
8	A I was on my way to Los Angeles.
9	Q You were coming from New York?
10	A I was coming from Chicago.
11	Q Why were you in Chicago?
12	A I really don't know. I have brothers there. All my
13	relatives were there at that time.
14 - 1	Q Does it refresh your recollection to know that you
15	had gone to a wedding in New York and were coming back?
16	A From a wedding? No. That couldn't be true because
17	I would have had my wife with me. I might have said that, but
15	that ain't true.
19	Q Do you remember stopping in Joplin, Missouri to check
20	on this carwash?
21 1	A That is where it was, Missouri. That is where it was.
22	Q Okay. Well, how did you happen to go to Dallas from
23	Joplin, instead of going directly to Los Angeles?
24	A I don't really know. I will tell you the car that
25	I was driving broke down.

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1 0 Where? A In Joplin, Missouri. I was driving a Cadillac 2 across for somebody, for some company. 3 Q Were you with anyone? 4 No, I was alone. And I figured I would just go see Α 5 Jack, I guess. I don't know why I went there, really. I á can't remember. I just went there. 7 Did you have any business in Dallas? Q 8 9 Α Maybe I went to tell about this thing. I don't know. Q Did you have any business in Dallas? :0 11 A No. Did you tell him about this carwash business to 12 0 13 interest him in it? Yes, actually him. I didn't know about his brother. 14 Α I really didn't know that his brother had the laundromats. I 11 didn't know that. 14 17 Ω You mean since you had seen Jack in '53 --18 Maybe I did know that. I don't know. Α 17 -- since you had seen Jack in '53 that maybe he had Q <sup>20</sup> money that he might want to invest in something like that? 21 Α Yes. 22 So that car broke down. Did you drive that car from 0 23 Joplin to Dallas? 24 No. They give me a different car. The man there Α 25 where -- that took the car in to repair it -- that could be

1 easy retraced because the Cadillac dealer is still in business. Q What dealer? 2 I hear him on the air all the time. 3 Α 4 Q In Los Angeles? Yes. I think he is in Culver City or somewhere, 5 Α 6 | somewhere like that on the west -- he is the guy that adver-7 tises he has got all the cars on the roof. I don't know if 3 you have heard that advertisement. 9 Did you let Jack Ruby know in advance that you were Q 10 coming to see him in 1963? Weren't you --I don't even know where to send him a letter. 11 1 Λ 12 Weren't you afraid that he wouldn't be there when you 0 13 | went there? 14 А Didn't make no difference, really. 15 Well, Dallas is pretty far out of the way from Joplin 0 15 to Los Angeles. :7 А I don't know. What time of the year was that? Was it winter? 19 0 November, fall. 20 Α Well, probably I went that way on account of the cold or 21 something. I went the southern route. I don't know. I 22 really don't know. 23 But it is your present recollection that you went Q 24 just to see Jack? 25 A Yes.

1 Q Was Jack Ruby surprised to see you? Α Not over-much so. I guess a lot of guys dropped in 21 3 on him. 4 Q This was only the second time you had seen him in 30 5 years. Yes. Well, he didn't -- I don't remember how he á - A reacted, truthfully. He didn't throw hisself all over me, if 7 3 that is what you mean. 9 Q Did you visit him in his apartment or did he visit 10 you in your motel? I never seen his apartment and he never seen my hotel !! A room. I just visited him in the club. 12 12 Q You say you were there maybe two nights? 14 3 Α Two days, yes, two nights, whatever it was. 15 1 Q Did you go to the club just one time or more than 1á once? 17 A I think I went there every day I was there. 18 So you think it was at least two evenings you went 0 19 there? 20 Α Yes. 21 How long did you stay each evening? 0 22 Oh, once I went to eat with him. Α 23 At the club? 0 24 No, we went outside to some restaurant. I don't think. А 25 he had food in the club. I don't remember.

1		Q	Was the restaurant nearby?
2		Α	Yes, I think it was. We walked over. I think it
3	was	in tl	he hotel.
4		2	Did you go with anyone else?
5		A	No, just him and I.
á		Q	Did you discuss that business, the carwash business
7	idea	a, wi	th anyone else
8		A	No.
9		Q	in Dallas?
10		A	No. I don't know nobody in Dallas.
11		Q	When you were talking to Jack about it, did he talk
12	to a	anyon	e else? Did he call anyone about it?
13		A	Called his brother.
14		Q	His brother Sam?
15		A	Sam. And then his wife answered. She wouldn't put
15	him	on t	he phone. I don't know like they were feuding.
17		2	So you didn't meet with Sam then?
18		A	No.
17	i 1	Q	Did you ever meet with Sam about it?
20		A	Did I ever talk to him about it?
21		Q	Did you ever meet with him about it and talk with
22	him	abou	t it?
23		A	No. I don't think I knew him. I will tell you the
24	tru	th.	I might have seen him once in my whole life.
25		Q	Was there anything else that you and Jack Ruby did
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on that visit to Dallas besides eat and spend some time at the club?

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A Nothing, no. I never seen his house or nothing. 0 Did he try to interest you in any business deals? No. The only thing that happened while I was there -Α he had trouble with the two guys next door to him. He asked me if I -- he told me -- here is the way he explained it to me. He said that they all had amateur nights and they were 8 9 turning pro and they wanted -- they didn't want the amateurs no more and they had agreed that they would not use no ama-10 teurs. They would take girls that belonged to the union or 11 something. I don't know what it was. And he says, "Now that 12 I guit and I got professionals," he says, "they still got the 13 amateurs." 14

So he asked me if I knew any union people in LA that 15 could intercede because -- I don't know -- they were union 1á houses and while I was there, he called New York, some guy 17 18 he knew -- asked him if he could help him.

17 Do you know whom he called in New York? 0 20 No, I don't. No, I don't. I don't even know if he А 21 called a union guy or who he called. Now most of the time 22 that I was there, Johnson was there, the guy that worked for 23 him. I think I talked more with him than I did with Jack 24 because Jack was always doing something, talking to somebody 25 on the phone or --

1	Q Was that Joe Johnson, entertainer?
2	A No, no. This guv worked for him. Is that is name,
3	Johnson?
-	Q Was he white or black?
5	A Black. Black. He handled the money for Jack and
6	everything. When we would go out, when Jack would close that
7	place up, this colored guy put the money there and the gun
3	there, leave it on the table for Jack to take to the bank.
7	Q Do you remember whether it was during the day or at
10	night that Jack called New York about the union problem?
!1	A Was it the day or the night?
12	Q Certainly, if he called the guy at the office, he
13	would have called during the day.
14	A Yes. I don't think he called the guy in an office.
15	I don't really know. I don't know. It was night. I am
lá	pretty sure it was night.
17	Q Did he get any letters or telegrams about the union
18	problem while you were there?
19	A No, nothing. Then he had a beef, too. He had to
20	go to court while I was there.
21	Q Was that with one of his entertainers?
22	A Yes. She exposed herself or something and he kicked
23	her out.
24	Q Had he wanted to fire her anyway
25	A I don't know.
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Q -- because of her big salary? 1 А I don't know. I never seen the girl. 2 He never said that to you? 0 3 Well, no. He told me -- he told me she -- she Α 4 tried to -- he said she's trying to close this place up. 5 Maybe they had a financial dispute and then he said she was ó trying to get him closed up. That is what his story was. 7 Do you remember Jack calling Bobby Faye in New York 3 0 9 City about the AGVA problem? Could be. I don't know who he called; absolutely I 10 A don't know. 11 Did you ever know Joe Glazer in New York? 12 Q 13 Α No. 14 Do you know if Jack called him? 0 I wouldn't know. I don't know the name of the person 15 A he called. I wasn't that interested, I will tell you, to lá. 17 listen to his conversation, but I know he called New York. 18 0 Was he pretty upset about it? Was it hurting his 17 business a lot? 20 Oh, yes, he was upset about it. Α 21 Was it hurting his business? Q 22 Yes, he cursed them people and all that. He was --Α 23 I don't know if it done anything to his business. I didn't 24 see much of his business. I will tell you the truth. I don't 25 think I hung around there all the time.

1 Q Well, when you say you talked about him discussing 2 the problem with the union, you said that he and the two 3 people next door -- Abe and Barney Weinstein? 4 I don't know them. I just knew that there were A 5 other places along --6 1 0 The competitors? 7 Α Yes. I didn't know them. 3 Q You got the impression that the competitors had 9 agreed with Jack that they would all stop the amateur nights? 10 Α Right. Right. 11 Why would they agree to something like that? 0 12 А I don't know. I don't know why. I don't know. 13 Did you have the impression that Jack had communi-0 14 cated directly with his competitors about it? 15 Α Not while I was there. He might have before because ιź they -- that was a -- already had passed all that when I come 17 there. He was trying to get help. 18 Q Did you know Janet Conforto? 17 А Who? 20 0 Janet Conforto. 21 А Is that a man or a --21 Jeda? Q 23 А Never heard of her. 24 Q One of the entertainers he was having problems with. 25 What is her name? A

1 Q Janet Conforto. Α 2 You know, I got her picture at home on that little postal card, but it don't sound like that name. 3 4 Q Was it Little Lyn? I wouldn't know. I would have to look at the card. 5 А I got it at home. á 7 Q Did you see any police officers in Jack's club while you were there? 8 9 Α Never. 10 Q Did he ever mention how his dealings were with the 11 police? 12 Α Never. He told me he was in good with -- oh, I will 13 tell you what happened. He did tell me about the police. He 14 said he had a fight with some ex-fighter and he took a pistol. The guy called him up, called him dirty names, Jew and all 15 ١ś that there, and told him to come down to some restaurant down-17 town. And all the employees heard it or something and when he !8 walked out, they called the police and when Jack got there, 17 the police took the pistol away from Jack and Jack beat the 20 hell out of this guy. 21 The police just let him do it? Q 22 Oh, yes. They let him fight fair. А 23 Did you get the impression as to whether or not Jack õ 24 was having any problems with police enforcing rules very 25 strictly?

1	A No.
2	Q Or problems with curfews?
3	A My idea of what he that he was in with all the
4	police, that he had done them favors and I don't know, but
5	if you own a bar, any bar in any city of the United States,
6	you cater to all the police because they are the ones that
7	close you up if there is a beef in your place or something,
3	so you cater to all of them in every city of the United States,
9	so I guess he was in with the police.
10	Q What else did you and Jack discuss besides the union
11	problems and this business opportunity?
12	A Well, he told me oh, he told me about his sister's
13	place, the other place, and we went over there.
14	Q The Vegas Club?
15	A I guess that was it. It was a different type of
lá	place, dancing, just dancing, that's all, with a Dixieland
17	band or something like that, and that is when I met Eve. That
18	is the first time I ever met her.
19	Q Was her club going well?
20	A I don't know. There didn't seem to be any people in
21	there when I came there.
22	Q Did you go there during the week or on a week-end?
23	A I don't remember.
24	Q Was Jack's club going better than hers?
25	A Well, he didn't complain about his club. I don't know.

1 1 I don't even -- I remember one time I saw a little something. 2 I don't go in for that. I might have walked out while it was 3 going on or something. I don't remember. 4 How did Jack's financial situation differ, if at all, Q 5 between 1963 and 1953, when you had been there before? Was ó the club going worse? Was it going better? Was it a higher 7 quality? 3 Α This was a different club. 9 0 Right. 10 Λ This was a higher quality club. I don't know. I 11 would call it a higher quality. 12 Was it your impression that he was doing better than 0 13 he had been? 14 Yes, yes. Α 15 Did he complain at all about money? 0 ١ś А No. No, he didn't. 17 Did he have any ideas as to some things you should 0 18 invest in? 19 Α That I should invest in? I didn't have no money to 20 invest in anything, so --21 What was his reaction when you suggested that he Q 22 might want to get into this carwash business? 23 Well, right away he got on the phone and called his A 24 brother, as soon as I showed him or explained everything, told 25 him how the people were waiting in line to get in this joint.

It really looked like something. There was a line about two 1 blocks long waiting to get in this place. I think it was the 2 2 first one because the man that opened it was standing there. 3 I spotted him right away. You know, he was dressed up. He 4 was an elderly fellow and he was watching the proceedings. 5 1 Q Did Ruby mention that he might file a lawsuit against ć his competitors? 7 2 Α No, no. Did he mention that he had gone to New York City or 9 0 would go to New York City to try to do something about it? 10 No. No, he didn't discuss that with me. А 11 0 Did you discuss your past experiences in Chicago at 12 all in the 1963 visit? 13 I wouldn't really know. I wouldn't remember. 14 Α 15 Did you get the impression that Jack had visited 0 ιć Chicago on occasion in the previous years? 17 А I don't know. 18 Did he discuss why he moved to Dallas? 0 19 Well, the way I heard it -- he had trouble with his А 20 brothers, the older one. 21 0 Hyman or --22 They were in business together. А 23 Q Hyman or Earl? 24 Earl. I think it was Earl; I don't know. λ 25 0 Earl Products Company?

1 1 Α Yes. They had some kind of business and I guess Earl was -- had the most authority in there and they paid 2 Jack off and kicked him out or something, brught him out or 3 something. That is when I heard he went to Dallas. I don't 4 know who told me these stories. You meet people in your life-5 time. I mean you are talking about a lot of years. ó Do you know why he went to Dallas? 7 Q Α Well, I guess to get in with his sister. I think his 3 sister couldn't handle these guys. You know, they got rough 9 kids there in Dallas. 10 Had she had some trouble there? 11 0 Α I don't really know. I don't really know. Maybe 12 13 she told me that. I don't know. 14 0 Did Ruby mention any plans he had for either new clubs or new businesses or anything like that? 15 16 Α No. 17 0 Did he mention any goals that he had? 18 Any goals? Α 19 Goals. Q 20 No. No. The only thing he really told me about was А 21 the trouble with these guys, that they agreed to do one thing 22 and they changed their mind and that was his big problem. 23 Did you understand that the union had changed the Q 24 rules or just that the competitors --25 A No, these -- that they made an agreement between them.

That is the way I remember it. I don't know. ۱ Q So he was mostly mad at them? 2 A Yes. 3 Q Was he mad at anybody else? 4 А Not that I know of. 5 Why would he call somebody in New York, if his Q á competitors in Dallas had broken an agreement with him? 7 А I don't know. Through the unions, I guess. These 8 unions work all together. ç Do you know or did you know anyone associated with 10 0 that union, the American Guild of Variety Artists? !1 А (Witness shakes head.) 12 No? 13 Q 14 Α No. 0 What else did you do in Dallas on the 1963 visit? 15 lś Did you go anywhere else? Did you see any shows? 17 А I probably looked around the town. I don't know. 18 I don't remember, really. I will tell you the truth; I don't 19 know. 20 Did you meet any of Jack Ruby's friends? 0 21 Α No, no. Met a couple of girls in the club and this 22 colored fellow, that is about all. 23 Q Did you spend a lot of time with Jack Ruby those two 2∢ :| or three days? 25 А I think I spent most of the time right in the club.

And you said that he --1 Ũ А Probably slept late because I stayed late there and --2 3 Q You had said earlier that he spent a lot of time 4 tending to business while you were there. Α Yes. 5 So would you say you had a lot of time to talk to 0 á him? 7 8 Well, he was doing things. I don't remember now, but A he was doing a lot of things while I was there, filling boxes 9 with Cokes and telling this guy what to do and all that. I 10 mean I didn't bother him. 11 What contacts, if any, did you have with Jack after 12 0 <sup>13</sup> vou left in 1963? 14 Just telephone conversations. A 15 What were the circumstances surrounding the first 0 lá contact and when was it? 17 It was -- when I left them, he asked me -- on the A 18 marquee, he bought letters, you know, about this big. He said 17 he bought them through an agency that -- the factory was here 20 in LA. I think I still got it at home. He gave me a sample 21 letter and asked me could I get for him at cost over here, and 22 he told me which letters he wanted, you know, what he should 23 use mostly. And I went up to the place and they told me they 24 don't sell individuals, that they sell direct to these outlets. 25 And he had a dog for me and I didn't want to take the

dog then because -- I don't remember why, because the car 1 1 2 wasn't mine or something. I didn't want to dirty the car. But he said he would send him to me as soon as he got a hox 1 or something to ship him in. 4 Well, then he called me and the FBI -- I told them 5 that. They could have verified it at the time. He called á me about 20 minutes to a half-hour after the President was 7 killed, but I seen it on TV and I happened to see it. 3 Q Well, let me ask you this: prior to the call on the 9 day of the assassination --10 Yes. I never heard --11 А 12 Q -- between the time that you left Dallas for Los Angeles and the day of the assassination were there any phone 13 14 calls? No, not that I remember. 15 Α Ιá 0 Didn't you have to call him to tell him about the 17 letters on the sign? 18 I might have called him for that. I don't remember. А 19 0 Because the record indicates that on November 17th, 20 1963, in the evening, you called him at 9:28 at the Carousel 21 Club --22 Α Could be. 23 -- and talked to him for eight minutes. 0 24 Α I told him I couldn't get them signs. 25 There is no indication as to what you discussed. 0

A Probably that is all I could discuss with him. That 2 was it.

3 Q What was the plan about the dog? When you left, did 4 you just have the impression that it was going to show up one 5 day or were you going to --

No, no, no, no. He gave the dog to some actress or A á 7 something, some person -- I don't know -- lived in the hotel and they couldn't keep him in the hotel and they guy's wife 8 1 was complaining. The dog was eating her shoes and her socks. 9 So he gave him back to Jack. Now Jack had his own dog, the ta 11 mother of this dog. In fact, the dog just died about eight months ago. I had him all these years and you know, I started 12 13 playing with this dog. I said, "Gee, they are nice dogs." So 14 he says, "Well, if you want one, you can have this one here, 15 the little one," and I told him that I would love to have him, lá but I couldn't take him with me. If he would ship him to me, a 17 I would pay the expense, which he did -- not he did, but that 18 guy Johnson did, I think.

19 Q So you expected that one day you would get a notice 20 that the dog had shown up?

A Yes.

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Q He wasn't going to call you that it was coming or write you that it was coming?

A I think he was in jail already.

Q No, I mean when you left Dallas what was your

understanding as to when you would hear about the dog next? 2 A I don't know. I don't really know. 3 Q But you had the impression that he was going to ship 4 it to you? 5 Α Yes. ó Q And so that you would get it -- you didn't have to 7 do anything. You didn't have to send the money first, did you? 8 No, no. I don't think I ever sent him any money. He Λ 9 just shipped it and that was it. 10 Q Okay. So you checked on the sign, the letters for !1 the sign? 12 Α Yes, I went to the company. 13 And he was going to do something about shipping the 0 14 dog. Those were the only two things that were left up in the 15 air? Ιá A That is right. 17 0 Was there anything left up in the air about the car-18 wash business, that Sam would call you or you would call Sam? 19 λ No, no. 20 0 That was just kind of dropped? 21 Α No conversation about that. 22 0 Did it look like that would --23 λ Because he had the brochures. He could have done --24 he could have done that hisself. He didn't talk to me about 25 it.

0 So it wasn't a guestion about him going into business t with you? 2 Α No. 3 It was just you gave him the brochures and --0 4 A I didn't have no money. In fact, I was telling some-5 body else -- I told the man at that wash that I had somebody á in LA that might put up the money if the proposition looked 7 right to him. I says these people do them kind of things. They 8 9 are builders and --Were you hoping that Sam would be interested in 10 Q investing money in that kind of a business? 11 It didn't make no difference to me. А 12 13 It wasn't going to be a situation where you would 0 14 run it and he would invest the money? No. I didn't even know Sam, as I told you. 15 A ١á Okay. The call on November 17th, 1963 -- what is Q 17 your best idea as to what that call would have been about? 18 You had called him --19 When I called him? А 20 At the Carousel Club at 9:28 p.m. 0 21 I probably told him that I couldn't get them things, А 22 them letters. 23 Did he ask you to do anything else about that? Q 24 Α No. 25 Did he mention the union problem he was having? 0

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2	Q Did he mention the dog?
3	A I don't know. I can't tell you for sure.
4	Q Do you have any recollection of how his attitude was?
5	Did he sound different?
ó	A I don't remember that call. I will tell you the God's
7	truth. I don't remember that call. If I called him, that is
8	what I called him for. I don't remember even talking to him.
9	Now the second time I remember, but that time I don't remember,
10	It ain't clear in my mind what I talked to him about.
11	Q That would have been a Sunday night.
12	A Yes. Well, that don't bring back nothing.
13	$\Omega$ Okay. You mentioned the call shortly after the
14	assassination.
15	A Right.
lá	Q Who called whom?
17	A He called me.
18	Q And what did he say?
19	A He told me about the dog, I think. I don't know
20	if he mentioned the letter, but I think he talked about the
21	dog, and he never mentioned, until the end of the conversation.
22	Then he says, "What do you think of somebody shooting the
23	President? Ain't that a terrible thing?" And he started
24	crying. He started crying. He says, "I can't talk to you,"
25	and he hung up.

! Q So it is your belief that it was a fairly brief 2 phone call?

3 Α Yes, it was a brief phone call. And I told the FBI at the time, if they want to verify that, my wife called me 4 from work and told me about it and I says, "Yeah, I know 5 about it." I told her a guy called me from Dallas and told ó 7 me about it and I says all of a sudden he started crying on the phone. And my wife told all the girls in the place about 8 this Ruby. They didn't know Ruby. I told the FBI at the ş time, I savs, "If you want to verify, go over to my wife's 10 11 place and ask these girls. They were there at the time my wife called me to tell me about it." 12 Did Ruby mention anything besides just the assassina-11 0 14 tion or did he mention how he felt about the President? 15 I can't remember his exact words now, but I know he Α felt real bad about it. He cried and hung up. He couldn't lś 17 talk. I don't remember the exact conversation now. 18 Did you say he mentioned the dog in that call, too? Q 19 I don't know. I don't remember. Α 20 Did he mention the carwash business? 0 21 Α Oh, that call was -- he mentioned the dog, yes. That 22 call there, he mentioned the dog. 23 And he said he was going to send the the dog as soon 0 24 as he could? 25 Α Yes.

Q Did he say what was holding him up? 1 A No. 2 Did he mention the carvash business? 3 Q 4 А No. 5 Q In your interview in 1964, you said that he did discuss the carwash business in that call. á 7 А And if I said it, he did. I don't remember. 0 You don't remember? 3 9 I don't see why that is so important if he said it Α or if he didn't. I don't remember. 10 11 Q You sent Ruby a letter in prison. Is that correct? Α 12 Yes. 13 Approximately how long after he shot Oswald was that? Q 14 Α I think he was in prison for a months already when 15 I sent it. I got a return letter from him, too, at home. lś Q Basically what did you discuss in the letter? 17 Just that I was sorry he got in all that problem. A 18 Q Did you thank him for the dog? 19 Yes, I did. Α 20 Did you save a copy of the letter that you got? Q 21 Yes. I got his letter, yes. А 22 You have his letter. What did he talk about? Q 23 Can you believe I forgot what it says in the letter? Α 24 I haven't looked at it in so long. I showed it to these two 25 fellows.

knows about him who has been around a little. 1 Q Did he ever tell you that he had met Lee Harvey 2 Oswald? 3 Did who, Harry Hall? Α 4 Harry Hall. Q 5 Α No. I never heard of Harvey Oswald until the shooting, ś when he shot him. Then I --7 Right. But you don't think Harry Hall ever mentioned 0 8 him since, that he knew him? 9 1 No. I haven't -- I don't think I saw Harry Hall 10 Α after the President was killed. I saw him before then. 11 Q Did you ever see him in Dallas? 12 13 А No. Where would you have seen him, other than on the 14 Q train, out here in Los Angeles? 15 A Yes. I used to go to the card room. He was there. Ιá 17 In fact, I owned the card room at that time, right over there 18 on Fifth and Flower. 19 Was that in the late '50's or the early '60's? 0 20 Α I imagine it was in the '60's. I used to be the 21 general manager of the Veterans Cabin and we had a little 22 card room around the corner, on Fifth there. We used to play 23 cards there and he would come in there. That is the last 24 time I seen Harry. 25 Q Have you ever known anyone other than Jack Ruby

The first time I heard of it, when I read 14 in the paper. 15 Q Did you know or do you know of Lawrence Meyers? 15 А Never heard of him, even. 17 0 Did you ever know a Harry Urhan? 18 A No. 17 Or Benny Binyan? 0 20 Benny Binyan -- Las Vegas? Α 21 Q In Las Vegas now, yes. 22 А Well, he has been in Vegas ever since I know him. I 23 never heard of him outside of Las Vegas. 24 0 He left Dallas in 1947. 25 Α I didn't know him.

Unless you 5 got the people mixed up -- I don't even know the person you are talking about here. ó 7 0 There is also a record on October 30th, 1963. З Α Where did they call, Chicago or New York? I called 9 Zuckerman the day before yesterday. That is my brother-in-10 law -- a hard-working kid. 11 Q I think Zuckerman -- certainly Zucky the Bookie was 12 out of Chicago. 13 Α I don't know him. I don't know him. 14 Do you know anything about the allegation that Ruby 0 13 had to leave Chicago because he had a significant debt that ιá was due? 17 I wouldn't know because I wasn't there in them years. A 18 I didn't even know what was happening in Chicago. I lived 19 in New York. 20 So who is the Zuckerman that might have been the one Q .... 21 in the 1963 phone records? That would be your brother-in-law? 22 Α My brother-in-law's name is Zuckerman. 23 And what is his first name? 0 24 That is funny. I said I know him. He is my brother-Α 25 in-law.

1 Q Did you have the occasion to call any relatives or friends long distance right after the President was shot? 2 Α To tell them about it? I don't think so. 3 4 2 Or to discuss it. 5 Α No. Did you have the occasion to call anyone, local or ó Q 7 long distance, after Jack shot Lee Harvey Oswald to talk 8 about it, to mention the fact that you knew Ruby? ç To make a long distance call to tell somebody? λ 10 Or a local call. Did you call somebody, "Hey --" Q 11 Α Yes, I know what you mean. 12 Because you said that a number of people from Chicago 0 13 that knew Ruby were in Los Angeles, so I would think you might 14 have called them to discuss it. 15 I don't think so. I didn't know --А lś Q Were you surprised to hear that Ruby shot him? 17 А I quess I was. 18 Ω You had stated that when you knew Jack in Chicago, 19 he was fairly docile .--20 А Very -- a very mild person. 21 Q -- and that when you saw him in '63, you got the 22 impression that he was a lot more --23 Yes, he had turned a little. Λ 24 -- a lot rougher. 0 25 А Yes.

1 Q Did you ever get the impression as to why it had 2 happened or just because of the nature of the business he was in? 3 λ I think it was the nature of the business -- well, 4 5 3 the way he told me, he says, "Mell," he says, "I am not a Texan," and the fact that he was a Jew and he got into a á business, I guess, that wasn't liked by everybody. I don't 7 think it is here either. And the people came in and tried to 3 9 take advantage of him and he says, "I had to show them that 10 I wasn't, you know, scared of them, prove the point that I was 11 a man." Was he defensive about being Jewish, feeling he had 12 Ω 13 to prove something? 14 I don't know, really. I don't really know. But you Α 15 get in other cities, in other towns, you know, where there is l ś not a big Jewish population -- a Jew is a big hook-nosed guy 17 with a long beard and robs your money and --IA I When he called you after the assassination, did Ruby 0 19 mention the advertisement that was listed above a Jewish man's 20 name that was critical of President Kennedy? 21 No. I seen the picture and I saw that, but he never, Α 22 no. No, I never heard nothing like that. The only thing he 23 beefed about was these two guys. That's all the beef that he 24 had about anything. 25 0 Did he mention that they were Jewish also?

1	A No. I didn't know they were Jewish. You just
2	mentioned it. I didn't know they were Jewish.
3	Q Did he mention when he called right after the
4	assassination that he was going to close his clubs for a couple
s	days and that he was mad because his Jewish competitors weren'
ó	going to close theirs?
7	A Well, I don't know about that. No, he didn't mention
3	it.
9	Q Did he mention at all that he was going to close his
10	club?
11	λ No, not that I can remember.
12	Q Did he mention that he had gone to Parkland Hospital
13	that day, after the assassination, or that he was going to go?
14	A He mentioned it to me?
15	Q Did he?
15	A On the phone?
17	Q Yes.
18	A I can't remember. I don't think so. I never heard
17	of Parkland Hospital.
20	Q Did Ruby call you again that week-end, the week-end
21	of the assassination? The assassination was on a Friday, the
22	22nd. Did he call you on a Saturday or Sunday?
23	A I think he only called me once that I can remember.
24	Q To the best of your knowledge, is that the last time
25	that he ever called you on the phone? $\frac{4}{4}$
	: 

1	A That is right.
2	Q Did you ever call him on the phone after the call
3	after the assassination?
+	A I don't think so.
5	Q You don't think you called him on the assassination
ó	week-end, then?
7	A I don't think so. I think he called me to tell me
8	about it and that was it.
9	Q Do you remember anything that you did on the
10	morning of Sunday, November 24th, 1963, prior to the time
11	that you found out that Ruby shot Oswald?
12	A What I did? I guess I did the normal things that I
13	do every day. I don't know.
!4	Q Ruby shot Oswald in the morning, which would have
15	placed it I think it was like ll:14 Dallas time, which
lá	would have been about 9:15 this time, Pacific time.
17	A Yes. Well, I was home in bed.
18	Q Were you still in bed at the time that you found
19	out that Ruby shot Oswald or had you been up?
20	A Oh, you are talking about when Ruby shot Oswald.
51	Q Ruby shot Oswald. Do you know what time you got up
22	that day?
23	A I was in the house. I know that. I might have been
24	up, but I was in the house.
25	Q Do you know if you had gone out that day?

1 Α I had been sick for quite a while back. I had had heart attacks. I don't go out too much. 2 3 0 Did you go out that morning before you found out that Ruby shot Oswald? 4 5 A No, I hadn't left the house, no. Of the numbers --0 á 7 Was that on a Sunday? А 8 0 Yes. 9 Well, my wife was home at that time. We were all Α 10 home then because it was Sunday. 11 You hadn't gone out to eat breakfast or go to church Q 12 or anything? 13 A No, we eat at home. No. 14 You mentioned a number of people from Chicago had Q 15 known Ruby that were living in this area. Do you know of any ۱á that ran any restaurants or food establishments out here that 17 had known Ruby? 18 Restaurants. Α 19 Or any kind of food establishment. Q 20 A I imagine Max Gold. He has been dead for years. 21 Is his last name Cold? Q 22 А Yes, Max Gold. He has been dead for years. 23 0 Do you know if any of them ever ran a hamburger stand? 24 А A hamburger stand -- I know a guy's daughter that ran 25 a hamburger stand.

1	Q What is her name?
2	$\Lambda$ Uta something. I don't know what her last name is
3	because she is married to, you know, somebody with a she
4	had it on Melrose.
5	Q What was her father's name?
6	A Willy Rosen.
7	Q Willy Rosen, R-o-s-e-n?
3	A Yes.
9	Q Do you know where the hamburger stand was?
10	A On Melrose.
!1	Q On Melrose. Is he still alive?
12	A Is what?
נו	Q Is Rosen still alive?
14	A Yes, he is still alive.
15	Q Had he ever lived in Dallas or just in Chicago?
16	A No in Chicago. I don't know if was ever in Dallas.
17	Q Did you ever hear a report that the Los Angeles
18	Police Department found out from someone who ran a hamburger
17	stand that you had told him that there had been a phone call
20	from you to Ruby on that Sunday morning?
21	A That I told this fellow that owned a hamburger stand?
22	I am trying to think of who I know that owns a hamburger stand.
23	I can't think of anybody.
24	Q Is there anyone else named Gruber that you know in
25	Los Angeles that they could have mistaken for you?
	.1

1 А Just my brothers. What are their names? 2 Q 1 Art. Well, they are not all here now. Ed, Art. А 4 Q They both live in Los Angeles? Well, one lives in Lodi. 5 A But you don't think you told -á 0 I can't think of anybody I know that owns a hamburger 7 Α 3 stand, now that you mention it. ş Did you tell anvone that Sunday morning or sometime Q after the assassination of the President that you thought that 10 11 Oswald would be shot? 12 I didn't even know who Oswald was. А Well, after November 22nd, after he was arrested. 13 0 [4] А Oh, you mean after he was arrested. 15 After he was arrested. 0 15 That I said that what? А 17 Did you tell anyone that you thought Oswald would be 0 18 shot? 17 I don't know if I did or not. А 20 Do you think it is likely that you did? 0 21 I don't think so. I might have said he was going А 22 to get hung. I don't know why he would get shot. You have 23 got me curious now -- a guy with a hamburer stand. 24 Did Ruby mention to you when he called you on the 0 25 night of the assassination that he thought Oswald should be

dead or should get the death penalty or anything like that? 1 The night of the assassination -- well, he didn't 2 Α call me at night. He called me right after it happened. They 1 didn't even know about Oswald. 4 Did he tell you that whoever had shot the President 5 Q should be put to death? ó А I don't think he discussed that with me that I can 7 3 remember. It would be a natural thing to say, anyway. I ş would sav it. 10 Well, apparently the Los Angeles Police Department Q 11 was that a hamburger stand proprietor said that you told him that Ruby had told you that he was going to shoot Oswald. 12 13 Is that true? 14 Α I don't even know nobody that owns a hamburger -no, that ain't true, no, no. 15 ١á Q So you didn't tell anyone that Ruby told you that 17 he was going to shoot Oswald? 18 Absolutely not. How would I know that Ruby was going Α 19 to shoot Oswald? 20 0 Well, the only possible way would be if he told you 31 after the President was shot or sometime after that would be 22 the only way you could know, unless you could read his mind. 23 Never told me nothing like that. А 24 0 How would you characterize your relationship with 25 Jack Ruby up until the time he shot Oswald?

А Just a mild acquaintance; that's all. 1 2 Q So you wouldn't say that you and he were really good friends? 3 Α No. I didn't have that much to do with him. I stop 4 5 and visit people all over. No President gets killed, that's all. ó 7 Did you consider that Ruby was interested in politics? Q Did you ever discuss politics with him? 8 9 Α No. 10 Did you have any idea --Q That is what kind of confuses me. I never heard of 11 Α him in politics. 12 13 Q Did he ever mention President Kennedy to you? 14 А No. 15 Have you ever used an alias? Q ιá А Just my middle name, yes. 17 ΞQ What is that? 18 Α Phillips. 19 Phillips. You used the name Alexander Phillips? 0 20 Α Yes. 21 How long ago was that? Q 22 А Oh, when I was a kid. 23 0 Back in Chicago? 24 Yes. А 25 You never used it after that? Q

1 А No. 2 Q You never used another alias? 3 Α (Witness shakes head.) Do you know anyone connected with the Teamsters Union? 4 Q 5 A No, I don't. 6 Q You never had any business dealings with them? 7 А I don't think so. Some guy from the union got me 8 out here during the war, got me a job as a crane operator. 9 Q Who was that? 10 ՝ I think his name was 🛛 -- if I tell you, you will laugh. Α 11 Beercase. 12 Q That is his last name? 13 А Yes. 14 Do you remember his first name? Q 15 No, I don't. A ìa 0 But he was connected with the Teamsters Union? :7 I don't know if that is the Teamsters. I was a crane Α 18 operator. I don't know if that's -- I don't remember now. 19 0 Was it a dock union? Was it crane operating on the 20 docks? 21 А In the shipyards. 12 0 The shipyards? 23 Α Yes, building boats. 24 Q Right. 25 Α That is the only union guy I ever met, I mean personally.

Q Did you ever know Carlos Marcello? 1 А No. 2 3 Q No indirect communication with him? A I don't even know who he is. 4 You said that to the best of your knowledge, you 5 Q didn't know any of Jack Ruby's friends in Dallas. Is that ó right? 7 I didn't know any of them. Α 3 9 You had mentioned Joe Johnson. Q 10 А Just the black man that worked in --He was one. You might be thinking of Andrew 11 0 12 Armstrong. He was a black man who helped run the club. Joe 13 Johnson was more of an entertainer. And you also --14 No, this guy wasn't an entertainer. Α 15 Okay. Andrew Armstrong sent you the dog. Q Ιá А That is the guy. That is the guy. I didn't know 17 him. I met him twice in there, the day I was there. 18 You know, the Los Angeles Police never talked to me. 19 You say that they told me this -- that I talked to a guy --20 0 No. They were told by the proprietor of a hamburger 21 stand that you had told that person about what Jack Ruby 22 allegedy told you. 23 А Well, do you know the guy from the hanburger stand? 24 Q No. 25 Well, you can find him out. Bring him to me. Let him Α

tell me that he told me that. 2 Q Mell, what he said was that a man named Gruber. 3 Well, it wasn't me. A ÷ 0 That is why I asked you if there was some other 3 Gruber. It wasn't me. It wasn't me. ģ A 7 Q Do you know of any other Gruber besides your brothers? 3 Δ Not that I know of, no. ş Did your brothers know Ruby? 0 10 А I don't know, no. ţ. õ You don't think so? 12 No. I am pretty sure they didn't know him. А 12 Other than the times we have talked about, did you 0 14 have any other letters or phone calls or other communications 15 between yourself and Jack Ruby? ίá When he was in the hospital, I sent him flowers and А :7 I got a reply. I don't know who -- I think his sister wrote 1å it. 19 0 Was that when he was dying? 20 Α Yes. 21 Q In 1966? 22 I don't know what year it was, but that is when А 23 the was sick in the hospital. He was supposed to be dying. He 24 had cancer. 25 How long before he died did you find out he had cancer? 0

I couldn't have been very long. I read it in the 1 Α paper. That is the way I found out. 2 3 At the end of each deposition, we give the witness 0 4 an opportunity to say whatever he or she would like to clarify or maybe it didn't come out right or you want to add 5 something, and at this time I am going to give you the opporá 7 tunity to add anything or correct anything you would like to. 8 A Well, the only thing I could correct now is the way 9 you talk -- you are trying to implicate me. That is what it 10 sounds like. I don't know nothing about this. 11 Q Well, I don't mean to imply that. 12 А That somebody said I said it. Why if somebody said it, bring the guy here. That is the simplest thing in the 13 14 world. And we will straighten it out. 15 0 But you say the Police Department never asked you ١ś about that? 17 I never seen the police. А 18 0 That is curious. 19 А Why would I see police? 20 0 No, I am saying if they got that allegation, you 21 would think they would come and ask you. 22 Yes, but they never did and I can't figure out who А 23 had a hamburger stand that I know. 24 MR. PURDY: As I said before, we will send you a 25 copy of the deposition and you can make whatever corrections

you like for it. 2 I appreciate your time and the Committee appreciates you taking the time to come in and talking with us. Thank you. 4 Is there anything else you want to add? 5 THE WITNESS: I just want to add they ought to forget ć ¦ it all. 7 MR. PURDY: That concludes the deposition. 8 (Whereupon, at 4:35 p.m., the interview in the above-<sup>9</sup> entitled matter was adjourned.) t 10
