Subsequent contact with Mrs. ALTA SHIRLEY and her son, JOHN, determined that JOHN SHIRLEY, when home from Texas Tech College for Thanksgiving, heard of an SHU student who is a neighbor of CHARLES GOOBEREAD, SHIRLEY's classmate, who had knowledge that OSWALD had often taken JACK RUBY's Cadillac car to a service station near the SMU campus, Dallas, for servicing.

Investigation identified the SMU student as WILLIAM VERNON UHLHORM.

Independent of the above, UHLHORN had been contacted on December 2, 1963.

BROOKHART and GEORGE T. BINNEY at Dallas, Texas:

On December 2, 1963, WILLIAM VERNON UNLHORN, student at Southern Nethodist University, advised that he had heard a rumor that a colored employee of Mustang Service Station located on Hillorest Avenue near Southern Methodist University, had remarked that LEE HARVEY CSMAID had driven JACK RUEY's Cadillac to the service station for servicing.

On December 2, 1963, LOWELL DES IMMILIER, Owner and menager, Mustang Service Center, 6511 Hillorest Avenue, advised that his employes, MODERT ROY, had made the comment that while in business for himself a few months age at Ross Avenus Automotivs, Dallas, Texas, LEE CSMALD had taken a 1959 Cadillas convertible to ROY to be repaired. EMMILISH stated he had discussed this matter at length with ROY and had endeavored to determine from ROY if he had saved the work repair order used in connection with the repairs of this alleged 1950 Cadillas. EMMILISH further advised that ROY had stated that in connection with the repairs of the Cadillas, he had driven CSMALD down town to JACK RUBY's burlesque house in Ballas, EMMILISH asked ROY how many times he had driven CSMALD, and ROY alleged that he took OSMALD down town several times. EMMILISH stated ROY had commented that the individual he had we had the content of the transfer of the assassimation of Freedent KENNEDY.

EMMLISH stated that he had subsequently searched through the repair orders which ROY had in his possession with negative results. ROY advised INGLISH that additional repair orders had been retained by the bookkeeper who had headled ROY's accounting matters in connection with the operation of the Ross Avenue Automotive repair.

ENGLISH advised that records of his office revealed that ROMERT V. ROY was employed at the Mustang Service Station when ENGLISH took over the management of the service station on Movember 30, 1952. In Marsh or April, 1963, ROY resigned to become self employed at the Ross Avenue Automotive

Service. NOY came back to work in Oceabor, 1963, at the Mustang Service Service.

On December 2, 1965, NAURRO VERIOUS ROY, machanic, Massens Service Section, resident, 2010 Matcher, advised that during the period he was self amployed in the Ross Avenue Automotive Service lecented to 4226-30 Ross Ivanue, Dallas, Texas, in late August or carly September, 1969, he recalls that an individual known to him at Mr. 1970 came to him for the purpose of doing repair work on a 1959 thits Cadillac Convertible De Wille (62 Series). ROY stated that to the best of his recollection, LEE hid stated on the first occasion of coming to him that he had been unformed to ROY by a colored min who works at Callel and Loren, a sporting goods company in Dallas, Texas.

ROY stated that he identified the person he knew to be Mr. LEE at LEE COMMID charcely observing photographs of OSMMID in the Dallas newspaper. Following the assacination of Precident MENNEDY. A photograph of LEE MARVEY OSMALD was displayed to ROBERT VERMON ROY ut this time, and he positively identified OSMALD as being the man for whom he did automotive repair work on a 1959 white Cadillac Convertible.

ROY stated that the repair work that he had performed for the person be knew as Mr. LEE would appear in his records. We made available two separate stacks of automotive repair orders to interviewing agents. A search of these records reflected no reference to a 1959 Cadillac.

RCT stated that additional repair orders were in the possession of an individual who had done accounting work for most Automotive repair. He identified this company as Whitehill Taxkedping System of Dallas, 13037 Glenside Drive, Dallas, Texas, home phone EL 4-2330.

ROY stated that he had performed services for Mr. LUZ on approximately four separate occasions and on one occasion LUZ use brought to the Ross Avenue Automotive Repair Service in

a 1960 blue four door Chevrolet by three other men whom ROY could not describe. On two other occasions when Mr. LEE came to ROY with the Caddillac, ROY drove Mr. LEE to the downtown area of Dallas, letting Mr. LEE out of ROY's car near the intersection of Elm_and Akard not far from Whittle's Music Store.

NOY denicd ever observing Mr. LEE in any burlesque however in downtown Dallas, Texas, and further denied ever observing Mr. LEE in the company of JACK RUBY, whose photograph ROY had also observed in the Dallas newspapers followed the killing of LEE HARVEY OSWALD. BOY denied having staced that he had driven Mr. LEE to a burlesque house in countown Dallas and further denied any knowledge that the 1959 Cadillac Convertible upon which he had done repair work belonged to or was connected in any way with JACK RUBY.

On December 3, 1963, Mr. CORDON F. CULLUM, President, Cullum and Boren Company, 1509 Elm Street, Dallas, advised that his company employs approximately ten Negro men, and he would attempt to determine which one of these men may have taken a company car to the Ross Avenus Automotive Service for repairs.

On December 3, 1963, J. WLITER MALLOY, Cullum and Boren Company, advised that records of his office reveal a repair order from Ross Avenue Automotive bearing No. 1184 and dated June 8, 1963, in the name J. W. MALLOY on repair of a 1958 Chevrolet station wagon involving relining of brakes and replacement of two twin drums. This bill was paid by check No. 28331 on June 8, 1963, to Ross Avenue Automotive, 4228-30 Ross Avenue, in the amount of \$47.85.

Mr. MALLOY advised that the station wagon had been driven to Ross Avenue Automotive by employee JAMES EARL FUCUALS.

On December 3, 1963, JAMES EARL FUCUALS advised that he recalled driving the company station wagon to Ross

Avenue Automotive sometime ago; however, he could not recall the date. He stated further that he could not recall ever having referred anyone to Ross Avenue Automotive. Photographs of LEE HARVEY OSWALD were displayed to FUCUALS, who stated that he had never seen LEE HARVEY OSWALD except in newspaper, photographs following the assassination of President KENNEDY.

ROBERT VERNON ROY was reinterviewed at Mustang Service Station on December 3, 1963, at which time he made available additional automotive repair orders which he had located through a search of his automobile. A review of these automobile repair orders failed to reflect any record of repair for a 1959 Cadillac. ROY also conducted a search of his former place of business at 4223-30 Ross Avenue and his second automobile, making available additional auto repair work orders to interviewing agents. A review of these auto repair work orders failed to reflect repair on a 1959 Cadillac.

On December 3, 1963, OLIVER C. VAN HOESEN, 2201 West Irving Bouleverd, Irving, Texas, furnished the following information:

A conditional sales contract executed by VAN HOESEN on July 23, 1963, in behalf of ROBERT ROY for Whitehill Taxkeeping System reflected that this bookkeeping system went into effect September 1, 1963. Mr. VAN HOESEN advised that this account was serviced by a representative named HANK STILL, the salesman who had sold the plan to ROY. Mr. VAN HOESEN stated that he, VAN HOESEN, had retained no papers or repair orders of any type belonging to Ross Avenue Automotive Repair Service. He stated that these papers would have been in the possession of HANK STILL on a temporary basis; however. STILL had advised him that all such papers had been returned to Ross Avenue Automotive Repair Service. VAN HOESEN further advised that ROY's affairs were in a very turbulent condition and that he had gone out of business with his affairs and papers in complete disarray and confusion. He stated that subsequent efforts by VAN HOESEN to contact DOY relative to submission of his tax work papers had been negative and that

VAN HOESEN has subsequently disassociated himself with the Whitehill Taxkeeping System. Himx STILL, according to VAN HOESEN, is currently a student attending a college located at Lubbock. Texas, possibly Texas Tech.

VAN ROESEN stated that at no time during his contacts with ROY at the Ross Avenue Automotive Service did he, VAN HOESEN, observe a customer driving a 1959 white Cadillac Convertible, nor could be recollect the description of any of these customers.

On December 4, 1963, ROBERT VERNON ROY was reinterviewed at Mustang Service Station, at which time he advised that LEON WILLIAMS, an accountant, 1201 South Brighton, Dallas, Texas, had handled some accounting work for him during August and September, 1963.

On December 4, 1963, LEON FREDERICK WILLIAMS, 1201 South Brighton, made available automotive repair work orders of August and September, 1963, of Ross Avenue Automotive Service, a review of which reflected no reference to a 1959 Cadillac or the name LEE. Mr. WILLIAMS stated that he had no additional automotive repair records pertaining to Ross Avenue Automotive Repair Service.

On December 4, 1963, JAEE'S EARL FUGUALS was reinterviewed at Cullum and Boren Company at his request, at which time he furnizhed the following additional information:

FUCUALS advised that he recalls now that a white man came into Cullum and Erren wanting to look at the yellow pages of the telephone directory indicating that he needed his brakes fixed and wanted to know where the nearest garage was. FUCUALS said that he could go to the Ross Avenue Automotive since he had taken a company car there and received satisfactory service. FUCUALS said that he believes the white man went to the garage on Ross Avenue, and at any rate he wrote the telephone number and a dress down.

RUEY GROSS, 7087 Yamini, Dallas, Texas, widow of BENNIE E. ORGOS, advised that they formerly owned the Hawthorne Torrace Aparthbisks, Throckmorton and Hawthorne Avenues, Highland Park, Texas, in 1956 and 1957, at which time they sold the unit be RAY WOODS.

Mrs. GROSS said that JACK RUBY rented one of her spartments with another white male, approximately the same age as RUBY. She said that RUBY owned The Vegas Club, Oaklawn Avenue, Dallas, and had a 1955 or 1956 white Cadillac. She said she knew he was from Chicago, Illinois, but he did not associate with anyone in the apartment building, other than the individual he was rooming with. She said he seemed to be a quiet individual who kept to himself, and the only trouble she had was on one occasion raying to collect overdue rent. She said she never met any of RUBY's associates or friends and she did not see any girls at his apartment at any time.

Mrs. GROSS advised that the more she thought of it she believed that the man who first shared the apartment with NUBY was a Doctor ALLESON, who had an office in downtown Dallas, but she was not certain of this.

Mrs. GROSS advised LEE HARVEY OSWALD was unknown to her.

Mrs. GROSS advised if she could recall any further information she would immediately contact the FRI.
